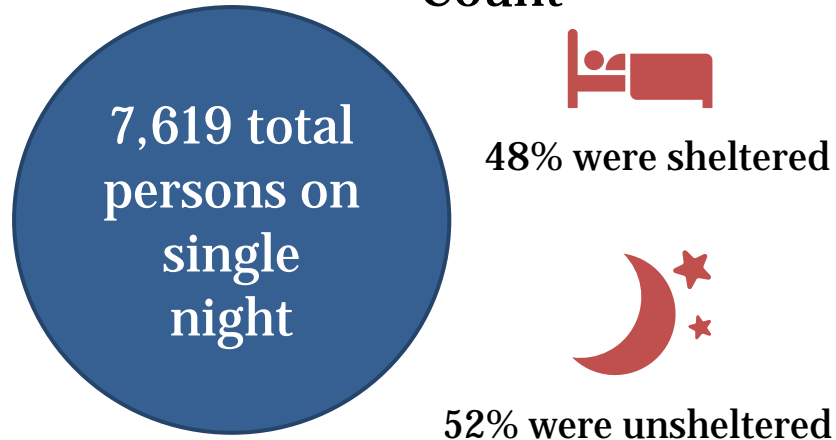

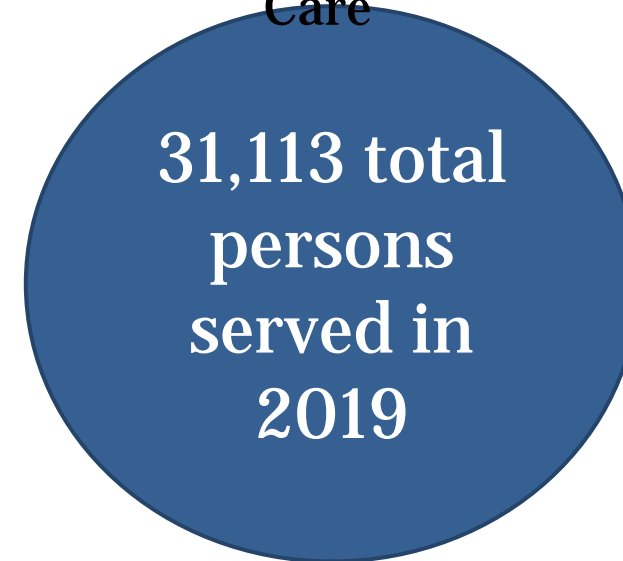

Count



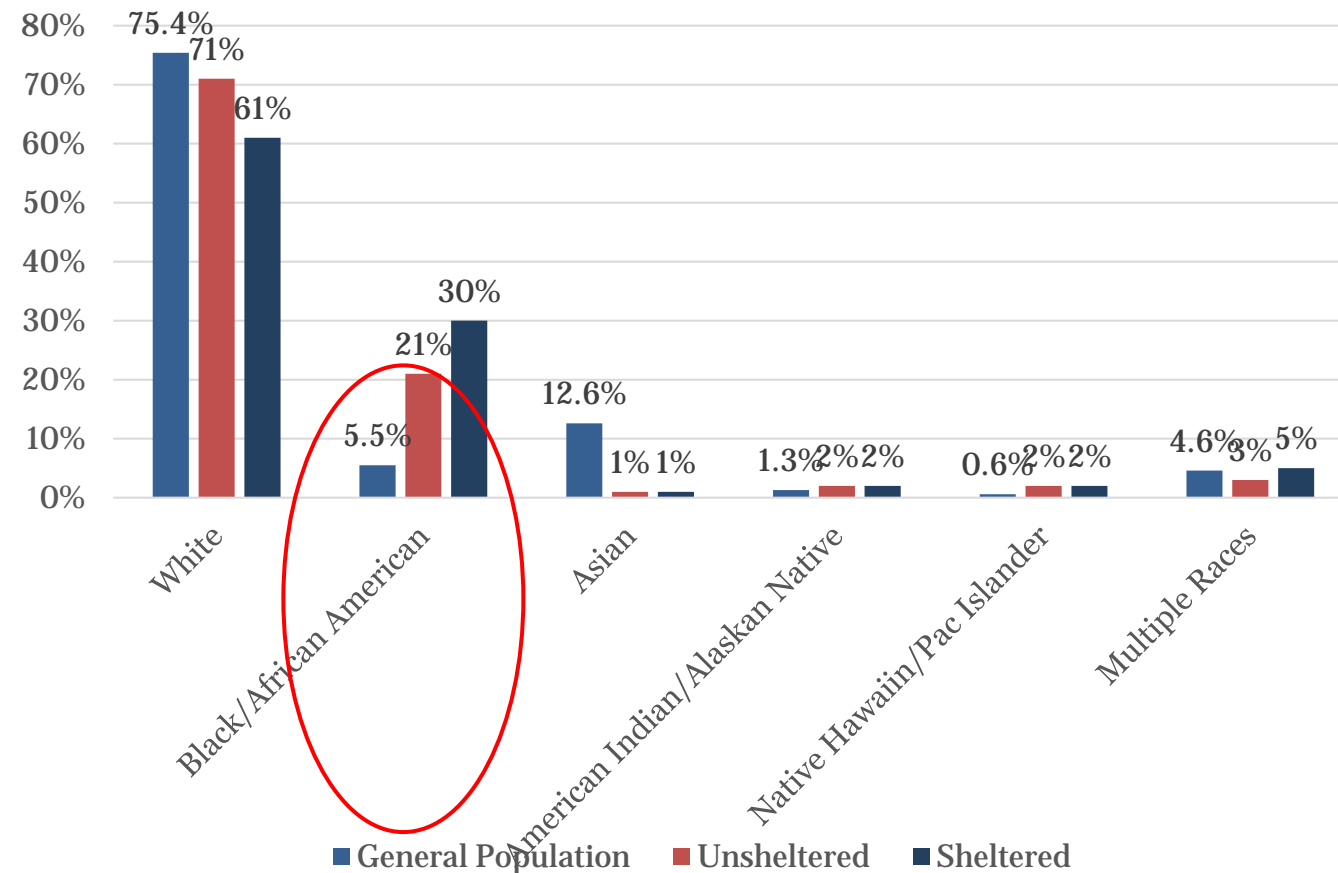
Persons Served Annually

San Diego County is a large geographic region. The size of the geography and the number of homeless persons is comparable to many states.

# Racial Makeup of San Diego General Population Compared to Homeless Population

Black people represent our greatest racial disparity when comparing the general population to those experiencing homelessness



Source: General Population data is from US Census Bureau 2019 Quick Facts San Diego County. Unsheltered and sheltered data is from 2020 PIT Count



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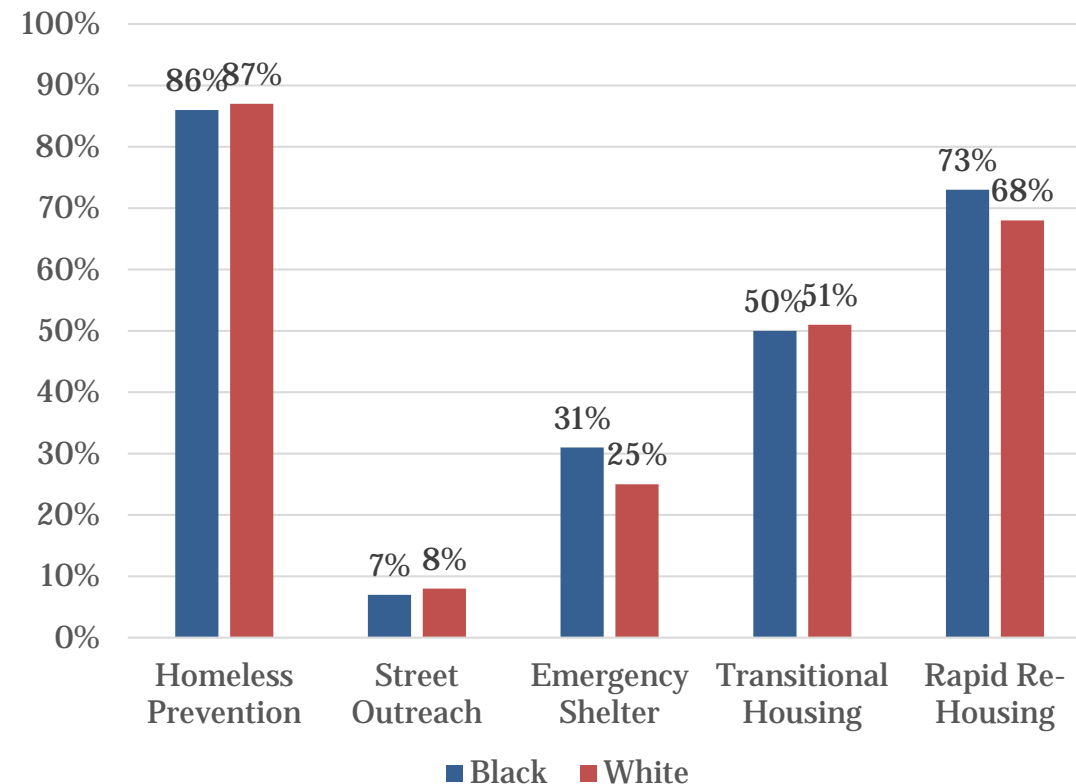


# Percentage of Permanent Housing Exits Comparison - Black and White

Percentage of Black persons across all homeless interventions is reflective of Black population in homelessness (Between 20-30%).

Appears to be equity in both access to homeless services and outcomes to housing (ie Housing exits for Black vs White).

To address disparities within the homeless system, the CIE presents an opportunity to coordinate with systems/institutions that may be influencing overrepresentation of Black people in homelessness (Housing, employment, healthcare, criminal justice, education, etc...)

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# Homeless System and CIE

- Homeless frequent user pilot, Project 25, was the CIE's first use case in 2011
- Many of original CIE partners, including RTFH, were homeless organizations
- Today homeless system is still a strong partner
  - A quarter of CIE partners are homeless services organizations
  - About a third of CIE users are homeless services staff
- RTFH shares HMIS data into CIE via common consent and technology process
- RTFH participates in CIE Advisory Committee and CIE Outcomes Workgroup
- Although a long-time partner, the homeless system is still learning, growing, and evolving its use of the CIE

# Success and Areas for Growth



## Enhanced Coordination with Housing/Eviction Prevention System

*"Oh they went there a few months ago and now they're here with us. When they called 2-1-1 in the past what were they asking for? Having this info helps me better understand their story and saves me time."*

## Enhanced Coordination with Criminal Justice System

*"Last week I received a CIE jail alert informing me of a client in our Whole Person Wellness program who was also staying at the shelter had been arrested over the weekend. As a result, we were able to notify the shelter staff and our Whole Person Wellness teams working with the client immediately, so her housing was not jeopardized while we watched for the disposition of her charges. She was released two days later, and both teams were able to resume work with her immediately."*

## Enhanced Coordination with Healthcare System

*"The CIE was extremely helpful for us with locating patients for our Health Homes Program (Medi-Cal initiative that provides health, behavioral health, and other services such as housing navigation and housing tenancy supports to people with chronic conditions including homelessness). We were able to search for them and find out if and where they were connected, so then we could be proactive and reach out."*

# Homeless Management Information System



## **What is HMIS?**

Required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for each regional homelessness Continuum of Care (CoC), HMIS is a local information technology system used to collect data on individuals and families who receive homeless services.



## **HMIS Privacy and Security**

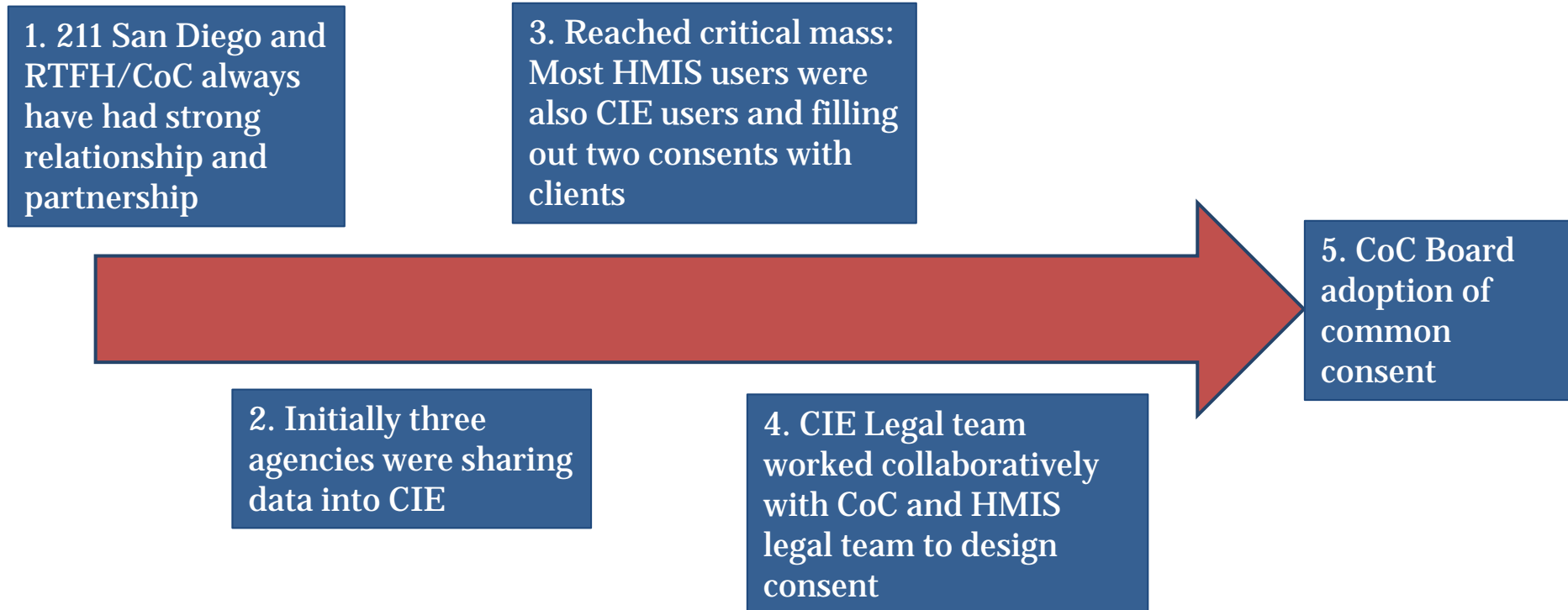
HUD HMIS Data and Technical standards lay out federal standards aiming to “Protect confidentiality while allowing for reasonable, responsible, and limited uses and disclosures of data.”

Each CoC must assess requirements for its own HMIS implementation based on HUD’s regulations and other applicable federal, state and local laws

# Multi-Party Authorization – HMIS and CIE

San Diego County CoC Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)  
**Multiparty Authorization to Use and/or Disclose Information**

**To Receive Coordinated Care, Referrals and Services,  
Please Review and Sign this Authorization Form.**

**ABOUT RTFH HMIS AND 2-1-1 San Diego CIE:** The San Diego County Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) managed by Regional Task Force on the Homeless (RTFH) and the Community Information Exchange (CIE) managed by 2-1-1 San Diego are two separate databases that are used to provide referral services to social services agencies for individuals with healthcare, housing, food, transportation, financial, and other needs. This authorization will allow HMIS and 2-1-1 participating agencies to collect information from you and your care team to assess your needs and put you in touch with social services agencies (Participating Agencies) they work with. Information will be shared with those Participating Agencies that provide services that can address your needs to coordinate referrals and services, track your progress and evaluate our success, among other things.

We are committed to protect your information from unlawful disclosure. This Authorization permits a Participating Agency to re-disclose health information to another Participating Agency and the information may no longer be protected under applicable health privacy laws. However, even if the Participating Agency is not subject to health privacy laws, RTFH, 2-1-1 San Diego, and their Participating Agencies are still required to employ administrative, technical, and physical safeguards to protect all information collected under this Authorization and use and disclose information in accordance with federal and state law.

By signing this form I authorize and request the Regional Task Force on the Homeless (RTFH), 2-1-1 San Diego, and Participating Agencies that they may refer me to or who may already be providing me with services to collect, record, use, and share my personally identifiable health, financial, housing, employment, and other relevant information with each other in order to assess my healthcare, housing, financial, and other needs, and to coordinate my care and provide comprehensive services to me.

The types of information that may be collected, used, and shared pursuant to this authorization includes, without limitation, the following to be shared in both HMIS and CIE:

- **Identifying Information:** Name, age, date of birth, social security number, address, personal ID, race, ethnicity, gender, contact information and contact information for family members, spouse, and my personal representatives

When a person accesses the homeless system, staff asks the person to allow disclosure of their data within HMIS and within the larger CIE network for care coordination

Not all HMIS data collected is shared in CIE. Only limited data for care coordination purposes. Data shared includes demographic, program entry/exit, income, non-cash benefits, and contact info

RTFH provides training to homeless system partners on authorization

# Technology Integration - HMIS and CIE



Worked with CIE to map and align HMIS and CIE data elements. A lot of prep work done which is extremely important



Created custom HMIS report with CIE data elements



Initially used manual report but now is auto generated. Internal RTFH data team created report – not HMIS vendor



Report sent to CIE on daily basis. Only sends refreshed data daily (only changes) not entire record.



Work with CIE when changes are made in HMIS (ie HUD Data Standards updates, etc..)

# HOUSING FIRST – SAN DIEGO & CIE

## SDHC Major Programs

### Provide federal rental assistance

- **5,200+** participating landlords
- **15,000+** rental assistance households

### Create and preserve affordable housing

- More than **21,000** affordable housing units
- **3,732** affordable units owned/managed by SDHC

### Address homelessness

- HOUSING FIRST – SAN DIEGO: **9,200+** housing solutions in five and a half years
- City of San Diego homeless shelters and services administrator
- City of San Diego Community Action Plan on Homelessness
- Operation Shelter to Home





# HOUSING FIRST – SAN DIEGO & CIE

## Programs Overview

### HOUSING FIRST – SAN DIEGO Launched November 12, 2014

- **More than 9,200 housing opportunities created** for San Diegans who are at risk of or experiencing homelessness:
  - Homelessness Prevention/Diversion
  - SDHC Moving Home Rapid Rehousing
  - Landlord Engagement and Assistance Program (LEAP)
  - Permanent Supportive Housing
  - SDHC Moving On Rental Assistance
  - Mainstream Voucher Program



# HOUSING FIRST – SAN DIEGO & CIE

## COVID-19 Response: Operation Shelter to Home

- April 1, 2020: City of San Diego launched “Operation Shelter to Home” (OSTH) in partnership with the County of San Diego, SDHC, Regional Task Force on the Homeless (RTFH), and the San Diego Convention Center.
- OSTH temporarily repurposes parts of the San Diego Convention Center as a shelter for single adults experiencing homelessness in the City.
- The program is part of a new, system-wide, coordinated plan to assist sheltered and unsheltered individuals experiencing homelessness to remain healthy during the global pandemic, and supports a regional approach to address homelessness during this state of emergency.

# HOUSING FIRST – SAN DIEGO & CIE

## 2-1-1 Partnership: Hotline

- Homelessness Prevention/Diversion program launched on July 1, 2017, to fill a gap in the City.
- January 2018: Launched partnership with 2-1-1 San Diego to manage SDHC's HOUSING FIRST – SAN DIEGO telephone hotline
- Services offered through this partnership:
  - Manages hotline calls
  - Provides information and referrals based on client need and for all services available in the community
  - Screenings and referrals for prevention/diversion services through SDHC



# HOUSING FIRST – SAN DIEGO & CIE

## Joining CIE

- HOUSING FIRST – SAN DIEGO joining CIE in two phases:
  - Phase 1: Cloud-based platform - completed
  - Phase 2: Full CIE database and integration with HOUSING FIRST – SAN DIEGO's future single platform - pending
- SDHC contracted homeless service providers also join CIE.
- CIE cloud-based platform benefits:
  - Automated manual processes between SDHC and HOUSING FIRST – SAN DIEGO hotline team
  - Centralized data in CIE and allows for comprehensive reporting, analysis and data-driven program decisions
  - System-level analysis on performance, trends, gaps and equity

# HOUSING FIRST – SAN DIEGO & CIE

## Next Steps

- HOUSING FIRST – SAN DIEGO Phase 2 of joining CIE:
  - **Phase 2: full-CIE database + integration w/HFSD's future single platform - pending**
- CIE platform benefits:
  - Two-way integration to reduce data entry overlap
  - Other agencies joining CIE allows for teams to work together with households
  - Centralize data in CIE
  - Analyze program performance, trends, demographic information, etc. to learn more about population across the region
