






Humboldt County Map by Jenna Castos of Pen and Pine









WHAT IS COLLECTIVE IMPACT?

a network of community members, organizations, and institutions who advance equity by learning together, aligning, and integrating their actions to achieve population and systems level change.



o Intent:


- Deep commitment to community-designed and driven development
- Foster shared intent and participation
- Comprehensively understand community need

Balancing perceived benefits and drawbacks

- + One collective, intensive process > negotiating across multiple meetings
- + Develop normsacrossthe group
- + Collective understanding of CIEsystem and proposed work
- Investment of time, slowdown of CIElaunch
- Securing participation of partners
- Level and process-setting required

FOSTERING PARTICIPATION IN CO-DESIGN

(In the middle of a pandemic, over zoom in the dead of Summer, with multiple organizations/residents/stakeholders involved, while learning about new concepts together...)

- Executive support and participant appointees
- Paid residents
- Meet frequently and with regularity
- Transparent about ambitious timeline
 and objectives
 - o "Qiffhangers"

Didn't backtrack

- Recorded every meeting and distributed recordings
- Virtual Rounding/Check-Ins
- Offline work



Backbone Activity.


- Development of operating budget
